The Homecoming crew festivities were robust this year with the largest turnout of alums and parents in the last four years. The day started out with the usual Row/Run race against the Track/CC athletes and alums. The weather was terrific with sunshine, flat water, and a tailwind, providing outstanding conditions for racing. Unfortunately it did for the local boaters as well and the Fremont Bridge went up disrupting the runners for only the second time in 19 years. The net effect of this was negligible however as the requisite number of male runners had already crossed and were well on their way to defeating the crew's varsity four, and the women rowers were already vastly ahead of their respective runners making the last 1000 meters of the 3 mile course moot as far as results.

The novice-alumni races were exciting with three men's alumni fours, a novice four, and the coaching staff combined for a pair against them all. A dramatic 5-lane

Autumn Recap

Autumn turnout for the Falcon crews showed quite a bit of growth over last year. Almost 100 percent of the varsity team returned, and the novice group expanded. Women showed great interest in the sport, making up two thirds of the entire team of 80 athletes.

The autumn regatta schedule reflected several changes. While the Falcon 4-Miler was discontinued, two new events emerged for Seattle Pacific crew. The first two events, hosted by Lake Stevens Rowing Club, were the Bull Trout 4-Miler and the Second Annual James Gardiner Challenge Cup.

The Bull Trout was a four-mile head race around the perimeter of Lake Stevens. The Gardiner Cup took a traditional straight course but with a lengthened distance of 3000 meters. Both formats proved favorable for the Falcon crews. With only light early-season competition, both novice and varsity crews came within one tenth of a second of winning all eight races over the Bull Trout's four miles. Both crews won three of five races over 3K on the following weekend. With autumn wins from all three varsity fours and from both novice fours, the stage is set for a strong championship season this spring.

The final autumn competition, a varsity-only event, was the longstanding Head of the Lake Regatta. All three varsity groups, the women's varsity open and light fours, along with the half light/half open men's varsity four did exceptionally well against advanced competition from up and down the West Coast. The men finished an impressive fifth of 19 crews, ahead of crews such as Stanford, Oregon State, University of Calgary, Western Washington, University of Portland, Seattle University, University of Puget Sound, Evergreen State and Pacific Lutheran. The women's varsity four went out with a sick stroke oar and pulled a rather impressive second-place finish over the three-mile course, finishing only six seconds behind Washington and steaming ahead of Portland, Calgary, Seattle University, Evergreen State and Oregon State. The light women's four, showing their tenacity, had the one win of the day over four other clubs and colleges.

Gearing Up for Spring

As the team stands up for winter, the focus will return to the small boats in spring. Men's and women's novice fours, women's light and open varsity fours—as well as the return of all four lightweight men from last year's NCRC and WIRA championship winning light four—promise to make this spring season an exciting time. The newest change to the lineups will be for the open men, who will attempt the first men's championship win in the varsity pair. Third-year openweight and captain Reid Shipley will join with last year's Dad Vail bronze medal stroke oar Tyler Van Stright for what should be a focused and very fast pair. All crews have demonstrated maturity and speed. Nearly every category will likely advance to post-season championship events.

start brought the novice crew clashing oars with the coaches immediately giving one alumni four early lead. Making a noble comeback however, was the coach's pair who managed to pull through not only the novice crew but two of the alumni fours as well. The women's race sported two alumni eights and a novice 8, but with a jumped slide from one of the alums the novices quickly built and then extended a lead for a solid win over the alumni. So the Dayee Hawes cup gets awarded to the alumni men and novice men for 2002.

Thanks all for supporting this year's event. Keep in mind that 2003 will be the 30th anniversary of SPU rowing and an appropriately heralded gala event will be planned. So keep this in mind as you plan your calendar for February 1st, 2003.

The spring season will unfold with strategic changes. In regular season, the Blue Heron Sprints will move a month later into April, and the standard duel with Seattle University will be coined the Raptor Cup. The championship season finds the shifting of the WIRA Championships to the first weekend of May, keeping the Falcon varsity fours from participating in Opening Day for the first time in almost a dozen years. This date change also makes the progression quick and challenging, since the Seattle Pacific crew will race in NCRC, WIRA and national championship regattas on successive weekends. By not dragging peak conditioning out too long, this tight schedule should be better for crew results, but the extensive travel could prove to be the biggest challenge.
