Questions pertaining to the Global Education Questions compiled by Les (see blue sheet).

Do programs achieve the learning outcomes?

How many international free Methodists programs are there?

What languages and how will we do those programs?

Do we want a Dean of Global Education?

Do we include study abroad or SPRINT trips?

Right now, study abroad is mostly organized for majors, but can be populated by non majors if there is room. Continue down this route?

Refine/revise/go over these questions and then we write recommendations on what we find. Thoughts?

What about resources and money—what if we come up with great ideas and there is no resources?

We need to be realistic. What if we have a vision and then cannot come through?

Would like intermediate feedback from the President if things are do-able.

There will be no surprises on either side; we will keep in close contact.

What about exchange faculty who are not Christian and do not match our faith statement?

We need to work on the details on this specific situation.

Cost structure to students?

To the university? To travel?

Questions about specific questions, but do we need to be more general—given our learning outcomes, are there gaps that might meet the learning outcomes?

Ideas how to make global studies more robust.

What we're already doing... how do we connect everyone?

Possibility of a form for students who individually went abroad on their own to evaluate and share their experiences.

What are other institutions doing? How do they do it?

Mission statement and outcomes the nature of our programs

Extent to which SPRINT is involved, if at all.

Small groups visiting other colleges/to see what answers they've come up with and sharing those.

How can we make this possible financially for students?

Focus on grooming students for scholarships and fellowships?

We will lay the process out, add/modify questions, and send further suggestions.

What are the priorities—which questions first?

Where would you personally like to do some work?
